#### Barbara Anastasion, Clarinet

Barbara Anastasion teaches clarinet at OPUS (as well as occasional other instruments). She is a 21 year veteran instrumental music teacher in Carroll County, MD. She currently teaches 4th grade band, 5th grade band, 4th grade orchestra, and 5th grade orchestra. She has also taught Kindergarten vocal/general music and 3rd-5th grade vocal/ general music. She has taught private lessons since 2000 in Harford, Baltimore, and Carroll Counties.

Barbara began playing the clarinet in 4th grade. She received a BA in Music from Towson University, having studied under Ed Palanker, Dan Silver, and Chris Wolfe. She received her Master's Degree in Curriculum and Instruction in 2008. Barbara is also a National Board Certified music educator. She is an alumni member of Kappa Kappa Psi, National Honorary Band Fraternity. Barbara is actively involved in the state level of music education, specifically with the MBDA (Maryland Band Directors Association), and is also highly involved at the county level. She also adjudicates for the State Solo and Ensemble Festival each spring.

He then pursued further studies with Troy Stuart in Baltimore and then with Alison Wells at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, where he was awarded a Master's Degree in Cello Performance. William also received a Diploma (with distinction) in Instrumental Music Teaching from the ABRSM.

He has appeared in masterclasses for Ronald Leonard, Hans Jørgen Jensen, Colin Carr, and Timothy Eddy. In the Summer of 2013, Nathania attended the Starling-Delay Violin Symposium at the Julliard School of Music where she studied pedagogy and performance with several notable violinists, including Itzhak Perlman. Throughout the years, her passion for music, along with her 22 years of experience on the violin, has led her to travel, perform, and teach internationally and at a professional level. She has experience directing and teaching at international music camps, as well as conducting choirs, string ensembles and teaching strings at elementary, high school and college levels in Florida, Texas, Maryland, Curacao and Peru. Her passion for music has also allowed her to perform as a solo, chamber and orchestral musician throughout the States, six European countries, Peru and Curacao.

Nathania currently resides in Westminster, MD, where she is the proud mother of a beautiful newborn girl. She also performs as associate concert mistress in the Frederick Symphony Orchestra. Her love for teaching and working with her students while seeing them develop has her teaching at several studios in the region. Nathania greatly incorporates technique and musicality in her teaching and she hopes to pass her passion of music to her students.

#### Tim Pinelli, Piano



As a member of our piano faculty, pianist Tim Pinelli brings over three decades of experience to Opus. His advanced pursuit of both piano performance and pedagogy began under the tutorship of Karen England of the Howard County Music Teachers Association in 1991. Later, he studied with Dr. Michael Adcock of the Washington and Peabody Conservatories at UMBC with Dr. Audrey Andrist, and with Dr. Hsiu-Hui Wang of Goucher and Howard Community Colleges. Along the way, he was voted Most Musical in senior yearbook and was the recipient of multiple music scholarships. Currently, Mr. Pinelli is pursuing a graduate performance diploma through the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music and is the recipient of the Bravo Award, which provided a grant to pursue his diploma. He also studied and still performs in jazz settings, recently serving as the consulting editor of the John Bresnik Jazz Piano method.

As a teacher, Mr. Pinelli has been an efficient and successful mentor for all ages and levels with a philosophy that emphasizes a strong foundation in both music history and theory in addition to technique. Recently, he has acted as an adjudicator in many of the area's major competitions. Among

his students have been future piano majors, competition prizewinners, scholarship recipients, and many who have succeeded in piano and theory exams. Formerly an instructor with Mike's Music in Ellicott City as well as his own private studio, he joined Opus in 2016, where he led the effort to establish the school's piano curriculum.

In addition to his music education, Mr. Pinelli holds a Masters of Science in Applied Mathematics from the Johns Hopkins Whiting School of Engineering, and works as a cybersecurity analyst on the National Vulnerability Database project at NIST. He resides in Sykesville, MD.

Dr. Runkles earned his Master of Fine Arts in Oboe Performance and Master of Arts in Jazz Studies from the University of Iowa and his Bachelor of Arts in Oboe Performance from St. Mary's College of Maryland. He formed the Twin Arch Duo, which plays a mixture of standards and his own contemporary jazz compositions with guitarist Charlie Trapp in 2013. In 2008, Dr. Runkles performed a series of Jazz Vespers services in Scotland. He served

Praised by the Journal of Music as "remarkably elegant...sensitive and brilliant" flutist Grace Ju -Yeon Wang enjoys a versatile career as a soloist, chamber musician and educator. Having performed worldwide across Asia, Europe, Africa and North America, she has performed on stages including Seoul Arts Center, Sejong Center for the Performing Arts, The Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center, Carnegie Hall and multiple appearances at the Kennedy Center.

Grace is a prize winner of the American Protégé International Flute Competition, Rochester Flute Association Competition, Baltimore Music Club Competition, South Carolina Flute Society Young Artist Competition and was selected as a semi-finalist for Astral Artists National Auditions and the Concert Artist Guild Victor Elmaleh Competitions.

As founder and flutist of Daraja Ensemble, she has made appearances at the Riverdale Mansion, Washington Arts Club, Amadeus Concert Series, and many more. The Quintet held the Fellowship Quintet Residency at the University of Maryland from 2015-2017 and were finalist for the International Chesapeake Chamber Music Competition. In 2016, the quintet traveled to Tanzania, Africa to start a new music education program for the schools in the sugar plantation area.

As a chamber musician she has performed nationwide as a member of the TIMF Ensemble and Lunar Ensemble and was invited to premiere Daniel Thomas Davis's piece "Book of the Lake" commissioned by the Walters Art Museum in Baltimore, Maryland.

She has studied with Marina Piccinini for her Master's and Graduate Performance Degree at the Peabody Institute of Johns Hopkins University and holds a Bachelor's Degree from Seoul National University. Currently she is pursuing a Doctorate of Musical Arts at the University of Maryland under the tutelage of Sarah Frisof.

As a passionate educator of solo and chamber music, Grace has given masterclasses throughout the US and Asia, and serves as faculty member at DeMatha Catholic High School, Honors College Prep and Woodbridge Music Institute.

#### Dr. Lisa Weiss, Piano

Pianist Lisa Weiss, a native of Quincy, MA, began playing at age three and made her debut with the Boston Pops at age seven, performing Haydn's concerto on D under the direction of Arthur Fiedler. She is a Professor of Music Emeritus at Goucher College where she taught private piano, directed the Chamber Music program and co-directed the Musical Theater and Opera program. In 2013 she was awarded the Todd Professorship, a funded position given one faculty member every five years to support their personal creative projects and pursuits.

Lisa holds a B.A. from Harvard University, an M.M. from The Yale School of Music, and a D.M.A. from The Peabody Conservatory, where she studied with Leon Fleisher. Her other principal teachers are Leo Litwin, Leon Kirchner, Claude Frank and Richard Goode. She also holds an M.F.A. in creative writing from Lesley University and has published in the fiction and non-fiction genres.

Of her New York debut at Merkin Hall, New Times critic Wil Crutchfield called her "a musician worthy of attention and able to hold it." For that recital, she performed Bach's third Partita, the Liszt Sonata and the

Copland Sonata. Ms. Weiss concertizes frequently as a soloist, chamber musician, and vocal accompanist. Recent performances include concerts at An Die Musik and Creative Alliance in Baltimore and at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall in New York City.

An advocate of new music, Ms. Weiss' CD, "Millenium Crossings," consists of contemporary works for piano solo by contemporary Italian composers. At Yale, she was a member of the Yale Contemporary Ensemble. She premiered a work for piano and computer composed for her by Baltimore composer Samuel Burt at Baltimore's Artscape.

Lisa lives in Lutherville, MD with her husband, artist and MICA professor Howie Lee Weiss.

Mr. Wiswakarma is a concert soloist and Founder/Director of the Chamber Music Series (Jakarta, Indonesia 1999 - 2006). He also served as the Director of the International Music School (Jakarta, 2000 - 2006) and Music Director of the Jakarta Philharmonia 2003 - 2005.

He has been a teacher at Opus for over 13 years and served as Opus Artistic Director from 20??-??.



While studying and working in Germany, Ela conducted the Harburger Maenner Chor, Harburger Frauen Chor, and Phoenix Orchestra in the Friedrich-Ebert Halle; the DESY Orchestra; The Hamburg Bach Society Orchestra; and she served as Guest Conductor for orchestral ensembles and choirs in both Europe and America. In 1998, Ela moved to Indonesia, where she lived for a decade. # Studio Lessons Policy

### Studio Behavior

- Please arrive at least 5 minutes early. This gives you time to hang your coats, use the bathroom, file fingernails, have supplies ready, and WASH HANDS.
- One parent or adult caregiver is asked to attend lessons of children ages 11 and under. Parents or adult caregivers are asked to be responsible for their children at all times.
- Observers are welcome in the teaching areas. Please be respectful of the focus and concentration necessary for a good lesson.
- Family members and friends are welcome to sit in the reception area, where coloring books, magazines, games and toys are available. Please leave facilities in the same tidiness they were found.

### Missed Lessons

- 24 hour notice is required to qualify as an excused absence. In the case of fever, exceptions can be made at teacher discretion.
- No portion of tuition, paid or outstanding, will be refunded or cancelled due to absence, withdrawal, or dismissal of student unless written notice of withdrawal is requested, received, and approved by the Executive Director.
- If the Carroll County Public Schools and/or the Carroll County Snow Emergency Plan is in effect, all Opus activities are cancelled, unless you and your teacher agree to conduct a virtual lesson. Decisions about cancellations will also be communicated via email and My Music Staff. When in doubt, contact your teacher.

Make-up lessons will be provided for...

- Lessons missed by the teacher for any reason
- Up to TWO lesson missed due to weather cancellation per school year, unless satisfied online at teacher & student discretion
- Up to ONE excused student absence per semester (provided during end of semester make-up week)

# Frequently Asked Questions

#### Instruments

#### What violin/viola/cello will my child need?

String instruments come in various smaller sizes made especially for children, and the size of the instrument is determined by the size of the child. Consult with your instructor to find out what size your student needs.

#### Does Opus rent instruments?

No. We have an instrument bank through which instruments can be loaned in special circumstances (such as waiting for instrument repairs), but it is not a rental program. Ask your teacher for their recommended venders.

#### Scheduling

#### What day and time will my lesson be?

Lesson day and time will be arranged directly between you and your teacher. Often, your teacher will let you know what time slots they have available, and you may indicate which one fits your schedule. Please be aware that as new semesters may bring in new students, it is not guaranteed that you will have the same time slot.

#### How do I know who my teacher will be?

This is up to mutual preference and our teacher availability. If you do not already have a teacher at Opus, we can recommend one that we think will suit your needs. To help you make a decision, you can schedule one FREE trial lesson with an Opus teacher of your choice. Please note that some teachers are either available exclusively online or in-person.

#### What lesson length should I sign up for?

We generally recommend 30-minute lessons for beginners, 45-minutes/1-hour lessons for older students, and 1 hour lessons for advanced students.

#### Registration

#### How do I register for lessons?

Registration is done online by visiting <u>www.opuscms.org/registration-and-documents</u> and clicking "Opus Fall/Spring/Summer Registration." This will open the registration form, which you may fill out and submit. It is important that new students also make a My Music Staff account.

# I am already a student at Opus and want to keep taking lessons next semester. Do I need to register again?

If you are already registered in the fall, your enrollment is automatically carried into the spring semester. In all other cases, enrollment is not automatic. Students must register for every new summer and fall semester.

#### **Events Outside Opus**

#### Do you offer lessons to help prepare for Solo & Ensemble Festival or other auditions?

Yes, just contact us! Group and/or private lessons can be arranged to help you prepare for auditions of every kind.

#### I need a piano accompanist for an event outside of Opus. Can I ask Opus?

Yes, Opus has accompanists who can both coach and accompany you. A typical charge for repertoire in Suzuki books 1-4 may be \$40 for every 30-minute rehearsal, \$50 for every 45-minute rehearsal, \$60 for every 1-hour rehearsal, and \$50 for every performance. However, pricing is ultimately up to the discretion of the accompanist. Typically, 1-2 rehearsals are recommended for every performance, depending on difficulty. For events outside of Carroll County, a destination surcharge of up to \$100 may be charged.

#### Pricing

#### How does pricing work?

You can find our prices listed on the website. These are posted per semester unless otherwise noted.

#### How do I pay for lessons?

Once you register, you will automatically receive a bill via email. We accept cash or check. Checks can be deposited in our Payment Box located beside the office on the main floor of the studio. You may also mail your check to

#### Do I have to pay the full amount up front?

You can, but we have other payment options. Our installment plans feature payments in two or four equal payments for a small additional charge. We also have an Early Bird discount which is available by request for payment in full.

#### How does the Sibling Discount work?

This payment option is only available by request. The first student you register pays the full tuition, and every additional student you register gets a 10% discount. This is how we both keep lessons affordable and thank our most involved families!

#### How do scholarships work?

Scholarship amounts are dependent on the funds available in the Opus Scholarship Fund and the number of students who apply for financial assistance. Scholarships must be applied for each new semester and are not automatically granted for continuing students.

#### Accessibility

#### My child needs an auxiliary aid or service. What do I do?

The Americans with Disabilities Act applies to the Carroll County government and its programs, services, activities, and facilities, which includes Opus. Anyone requiring an auxiliary aid or service for effective communication or who has a complaint should contact Madeline M. Morey, the Americans with Disabilities Act Coordinate, at one of the following no later than 72 hours before the event:

# **Student & Parent Guide**

### Login

To log in, visit <u>www.opuscms.org/login</u> and enter your login credentials, or you can find the same login portal by visiting our website and navigating to the Registration and Documents page and/or the Current Student Login page.

If you forget your login credentials, select "Forgot your password," enter your email address, and you will receive a password reset email. Alternatively, contact us at <u>info@opuscms.org</u> and we will send you a password reset email.

### Home Screen

The Home Screen will display your next scheduled event, the practice hours you've logged for the week, and your attendance record over the past 90 days. You can also see recent notes, borrowed items, make-up credits, and assigned repertoire that your teacher has put into MMS for you, along with available downloads.

### Calendar

The calendar allows you to view your scheduled lessons, cancel lessons if necessary, and (on occasion) register for Opus events. To cancel a lesson through MMS, click on the lesson and select "Cancel Attendance," and your teacher will be notified immediately. Note that the lesson must be cancelled at least 24 hours in advance in order to qualify for that semester's make-up lesson.

#### Attendance & Notes

Here you can view your attendance over the course of your lessons, as well as access any notes your teacher may have given you through MMS. You can see when and why make-up credits are issued, and when they were used. You can also print an attendance report should you need to.

#### Accounts & Invoices

Here you can view any charges, payments, and invoices sent to your Opus account, as well as your current balance. For questions regarding billing, contact our Financial Assistant, Rebecca Borger, at <u>billing@opuscms.org</u>

### Studio Info

Here you can find Opus & faculty contact information, as well as your current make-up lesson total.

### Studio News

Here you can access important studio announcements. It is a good place to check for information regarding registration, recitals, volunteering, etc.. This information is also dispersed in studio-wide emails.

### Library & Downloads

A record and due date of your borrowed books or instruments will be displayed here. You can also access important documents, such as the studio calendar, instrumental rental contract, and the 100 Days of Practice form.

### Practice Log

This is a useful tool for you and your teacher to track the frequency and quality of practice time. Your teacher can view the logs you make, as well as any accompanying questions or notes you write in the log entry for the day. \*Scholarship students are required to use this tool.\*

#### Repertoire

Here, you and your teacher have the option to track your progress on specific pieces of repertoire. Each piece you add can have its status set to Requested, Recommended, In Progress, or Completed. Your teacher may even upload sheet music here in case you have lost your copy.

### Email History

Here you can see the history of any emails sent to you via My Music Staff, including the text, senders, recipients, the subject, and the date of the email.

### Settings

Should you need to change any of your personal information or login credentials, you can do so here, located in the top right corner of the My Music Staff page.

# Student Recitals

Registration for any of the following events is done on a first come, first serve basis by filling out online forms that parents/students will receive via email.

#### Master Classes

WHAT THEY ARE > Master classes are a relaxed, fun way for a student to get used to playing with their accompanist and/or playing for a slightly larger audience. Students will play their recital piece(s) for their Recital Prep Teacher(s) and fellow Opus students, and will in turn receive helpful comments from their audience members. Getting tips from a faculty member other than their own teacher is especially valuable, as it makes for more diverse and comprehensive instruction. This also gives students the opportunity to hear other Opus students play and share comments of their own.

HOW THEY WORK > Opus holds 1-2 Master Class day(s) per semester approximately 2 weeks before the recital date. They are 1-hour, group-style sessions, and the cost of 1 Master Class is included in your semester tuition. Multiple sessions per day are available for sign up. If you cannot make the Dress Rehearsal, you MUST attend a Master Class.

#### **Dress Rehearsals**

1 week before Recital, 2 per year

WHAT THEY ARE > Dress Rehearsals are designed to help performers feel comfortable in the recital space and with the venue's piano. We do a practice run through the entire concert, during which students are guided through the recital process: when to get onstage, when/how to bow, and other reminders about the recital day. Concert attire is not required for this event.

HOW THEY WORK > Opus holds a Dress Rehearsal approximately 1 week in advance of each of the endof-semester Recitals. Each student will play in ONE of the Dress Rehearsals, usually corresponding to the Recital of that same time. If you cannot make a Master Class, you MUST attend a Dress Rehearsal.

#### <u>Recitals</u>

📰 End of Fall/Spring Semester, 2 per year

WHAT THEY ARE > Recitals are formal concerts where students have the opportunity to showcase their semester-long work! Students arrive 15-20 minutes early to unpack, tune, and warm up. Concert attire is required for this event (black & white or all-black formal clothing, with color exceptions for our youngest players). A reception is held afterwards, for which we need volunteers to bring snacks and drinks. More detailed information about reception volunteering will be provided as we approach the Recital date.

HOW THEY WORK > Opus holds Recitals at the end of each Fall and Spring semester. Each student performs in ONE of the Recitals. Students must participate in either a Master Class or Dress Rehearsal in order to qualify for an end-of-semester Recital.

# Solo Recitals

To give a Solo Recital, a student prepares and presents multiple pieces in a concert all their own. Students of any age/ability can decide to give a Solo Recital; however, it is helpful to consider a student's discipline and performance maturity when assessing when/whether to do so.

#### STEP 1: Tell your teacher

Your teacher will be your primary guide through this experience, so you first want to let your teacher know that you'd like to give a solo recital. The two of you will choose and prepare your repertoire and go over any questions you may have.

#### STEP 2: Decide on a date, time, and place

We recommend at least 1 semester's worth of lessons with your teacher to adequately prepare. The ensemble room at the Opus studio is available for use as your recital venue as long as you reserve it at least 60 days in advance. Your teacher can help you reserve this room using MMS. Alternatively, you may reserve a venue outside of Opus to the agreement of you and your teacher.

#### STEP 3: Find an accompanist if needed

It is important that you do this step EARLY. We have talented pianists in our faculty who would love to play with you. Please request accompanists at least 60 days in advance and consult with them about their price for hire. Talk to an accompanist directly or contact them using the information found in the Faculty Directory under Piano (page 3). There is no guarantee that a specific accompanist will be available, but it is more likely the earlier you ask. Or you may ask an accompanist outside of Opus.

> You must have at least 2 rehearsals with your accompanist. Your teacher may have recommendations about when rehearsals should take place, but rehearsals are ultimately scheduled between you and your accompanist, NOT your teacher. Rehearsals will be added to the MMS calendar by your accompanist if they are taking place at the studio.

#### STEP 4: Invite friends and family

You are doing this to showcase your hard work and talent, so get an audience! Tell your family, your friends, your math teacher, your neighbor – anyone who might like to hear you play. Putting together a flyer with all the basic information will allow you to share it efficiently.

#### STEP 5: Organize a reception (optional)

The Opus downstairs lobby is available as a reception hall. Opus is happy to provide tables, tableware (if available), and tablecloths for your use. Please wash all tablecloths before returning them to us and clean the area once the event is over: remove all trash/recycling and vacuum the area before you leave.

# Supporting Opus

Opus is a registered 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization that relies on community volunteers and support. Here's how you can help!

#### Volunteering

Opus needs volunteers of all ages in a variety of categories. Students are invited to earn service hours!

CONCERTS & RECEPTIONS > Help set up and take down receptions. Provide food, drinks, or other supplies. Receptions typically take place 6-8 times per year and information about volunteer opportunities is shared with the Opus community through studio-wide emails.

FACILITY MAINTENANCE > Help clean the studio, weed/prune in the summer/spring, snow shoveling/ plowing in the winter, and occasional special projects, such as painting signs or moving pianos. Volunteers are requested via studio-wide emails and usually have days of notice (garden work) or hours of notice (snow).

BOARD/COMMITTEE MEMBERS > Opus relies on an active board and committee members. Volunteers are invited to help with the Development Committee, the Scholarship Committee, the Finance Committee, and the Board. For more information, contact <u>info@opuscms.org</u>

OPUS LIBRARY > Opus has a growing library in the top floor of the studio filled with music books and sheet music that needs organizing and categorizing. For more information, contact <u>info@opuscms.org</u>

#### Donations

MONETARY > We accept donations through PayPal and check (especially if your donation exceeds \$100). Checks can be delivered by mail to the Opus address or dropped off in person. If your place of work has an Employer Match Charitable Donations program or a Charitable Foundation, you can nominate Opus and your donation will have even greater impact! \*All donations are tax deductible to the full extent of the law.\*

INSTRUMENTS > If you have an instrument that is in playing condition but isn't being used, consider donating it to Opus! Coupled with scholarship funds, we hope our instrumental library will ensure that anyone can learn to play an instrument regardless of their financial situation. We are looking for string, woodwind, and brass instruments.

FURNITURE > As we renovate our studio, we seek to replace and update furniture. We are especially looking to replace our fluorescent lighting with LED and ink for our printers.

# What Opus Values

One of the things that makes Opus different from other private music schools is (1) our commitment to a holistic musical education, and (2) our dedication to enriching the wider community. We don't simply provide private music lessons – we present workshops, ensemble & performance options, faculty concerts, and innovative educational programs. #### Performances & Workshops

In addition to semester Recitals, students have the opportunity to perform in various venues. We feature formal and informal settings, soloists and ensembles, and occasionally provide workshop opportunities. Past or annual events include

OPUS POCUS > One of the annual events that takes place every Halloween season is Opus Pocus. Participants are invited to perform in costume, often starring a spooky (minor) rendition of one of the pieces they're working on. As this event doubles as a fundraiser, participants and audience members can purchase "Applause Tokens" to vote for their favorite performer, and the winner is given the Spooktacular Award. Other fun, thematically relevant awards are passed out to each performer at the end of the program.

FESTIVAL OF TREES > During the holiday season, Opus has been invited to provide live music during the annual Festival of Trees organized by the Shepherds Staff in Carroll County, MD. In 2021, we also offered a day-long workshop during which students learned holiday ensemble music to perform at the event.

LIBRARY CONCERTS > A relaxed way to explore performance, Opus periodically appears at public libraries throughout Carroll County, showcasing students at Opus. Sometimes, faculty and students play together.

ADULT SOIRÉE > Part of Opus' mission is to provide music instruction to students of any age – including adults! Near the end of the spring semester, adult students get together at the Opus studio for an evening of casual music performance, light refreshments & beverages, and socializing.

BEATS & BLOOMS > In July of 2021, this bustling outdoor event at Homestead Products granted students their first opportunity to perform for an inperson audience since the start of the pandemic.

**NEW!** ADVANCED STUDENTS' CONCERT > The Carroll County Arts Center has offered to highlight particularly advanced and talented Opus students at our new Advanced Students' Concert. Qualifying students are nominated by their teacher and approved by the Board of Directors.

# Opus Concert Club

Attending concerts and listening to live music is INTEGRAL to your growth as a musician. Opus wants to encourage you to go to as many concerts as possible! To further this goal, we hold a rewards program called Opus Concert Club. A Concert Club Card (CCC) is provided to students by order. If you fill up your card with punches, you become a member of the club and will qualify for certain special Rewards.

#### Rules

- 1. Order a CCC by request from your teacher or the Executive Director. There is no deadline.
- 2. For every concert you attend, you receive a punch on your CCC.
  - You must be attending, not performing. If your name is on the program, it will not count.
  - Concerts of ALL kinds count, not just classical music performances. School concerts, festivals, even rock shows!
- 3. Bring a copy of your ticket, program, or a picture of you at the concert to your teacher to get a punch.
  - BONUS: If an Opus faculty member is performing at the concert or it's an Opus event that you are not playing in, you will get TWO punches!
- 4. You will have 2 semesters to complete your CCC (10 punches total). Bring your full CCC to us before OR at our Concert Club Movie Night to receive your Concert Club Button.

### Rewards

- Everyone who fills their CCC will become an official member of the Opus Concert Club and receive a Concert Club Button proclaiming their membership. Wear it on Recital day along with your 100 Days medal & pin(s) to show your accomplishment!

# Opus Treasure Quest Challenge

This extracurricular activity hones musical skills that may or may not be taught in the classroom or even in private lessons. The musical tasks are framed as "quests" to be completed among five themed islands, and are specifically designed to suit an individual student's needs. The simple, step-by-step nature of these tasks makes this challenge both fun and achievable. You'll be amazed by what you can accomplish!

#### Quests

- 1. PRACTICE QUEST | Garden Growth Island > Grow good habits. Students practice for 6 days per week for 6 weeks.
- 2. PERFORMANCE QUEST | Siren Song Island > Share music through performance. Students create a program, hold 3 dress rehearsals, and stage a (private) performance.
- 3. LISTENING QUEST | Treasure Island > Discover the rich musical world. Students watch a faculty concert, a student recital, and a concert/YouTube video of their choice, and record their reflections.
- 4. SKILLS QUEST | Skills Mountain Island > Dare to test yourself. Students identify 2 skills they want to improve, practice them, apply them, and reflect on them.
- 5. INTERVIEW QUEST | Mysterious Muse Island > *Learn from others*. Students choose someone who inspires them and plays/used to play an instrument and interviews them.

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
